Re: Scientist Support of Raúl Grijalva for Secretary of the Interior

Dear President-elect Obama:

As you make appointments to your Cabinet, we, the undersigned conservation scientists, encourage you to consider Congressman Raúl Grijalva for Secretary of the Interior. The position of Secretary of the Interior is critically important to ameliorating the eight years of environmental damage done by the Bush administration and we believe that Congressman Grijalva's background and record show him to be a leader ready for this challenge.

Grijalva recently released A Report on the Bush Administration Assault on our National Parks, Forests and Public Lands (A Partial List), which shows the breadth and depth of his passion about conservation and public lands and reveals his experience as the Chairman of the House Resources Subcommittee on National Parks, Forests and Public Lands. In this report he decries that under the Bush administration, "science has been manipulated to enrich industry." Most if not all conservation scientists share this frustration, often based on personal experience, and look forward to working with the agencies of the Department of the Interior under the direction of someone who understands and values science.

Congressman Grijalva has experience that would prepare him to lead the full range of agencies within the Department of the Interior. In addition to his chairmanship and work on public lands, he has worked closely with Native American communities — his district includes seven sovereign nations — and he has served on the Subcommittee on Insular Affairs. As a Representative from the arid southwest he is intimately familiar with the responsibilities of the Bureau of Reclamation.

The challenges facing the next Secretary of the Interior require a broad thinker who understands how to protect and steward natural resources and lands in a changing climate under the pressure for increased energy production. Congressman Grijalva has shown that he grasps the tradeoffs involved in such decisions. For example, he was a leading proponent of the Sonoran Desert Conservation Plan, which protected the natural treasures of the desert environment while allowing reasonable development. This approach has become a template for proactive land use planning in other ecosystems.

We have read that there is pressure for you to appoint a person with a traditional sportsperson's background as the next Secretary of the Interior. But with the broad portfolio overseen by the Department of the Interior, we believe that it is far more important today to have a Secretary who understands ecosystem science and who is committed to science-based decisionmaking. It is not that Congressman Grijalva does not understand the interests of sportspersons — rather he sees them in a broad context. For example, he oversaw a study that linked oil and gas exploration to loss of Western hunting habitat.

As individuals who are directly involved in conservation science and regularly interact with the federal agencies within the Department of the Interior, we heartily endorse Raúl Grijalva to be appointed as its Secretary.
