Grown here. Picked here. From here.

Of course, apples are what Washington is known for. That's why McDonald's bought 13 million pounds of them in 2009. The primary supplier of those apples is Tree Top, a company founded in Yakima Valley 50 years ago. When an apple is dipped at one of

our restaurants, you can bet it hasn't traveled far from a Washington tree.

And fish? This is virtually the home of the Filet-O-Fish, a McDonald's classic since its introduction in 1962. In fact, 95 out of



every 100 Filet-O-Fish sandwiches served here comes from the cold waters of the Pacific Northwest. In total, 43 million pounds of Pacific Northwest fish found its way into a cozy steamed bun last year.

Last (and not least, to hear the cows tell it), there's Washington milk. McDonald's purchased over 497,000 gallons of our milk last year. If you're reading this, nearly 100% of the milk

in your nearby McDonald's comes from Darigold," a Northwest cooperative owned by its over 500 dairy farmers from Lynden to Chehalis to Spokane.
